Friends of Staunton State Park

The park is the legacy of Frances H. Staunton whose parents were doctors and homesteaded the site around the turn of the century. Frances' mother, Dr. Rachael Staunton, treated the local population that needed care as well as patients with tuberculosis.

The Staunton Ranch is the heart of the park. The park's history of human uses includes ranching, the Staunton family retreat, a turn-of-the-20th century saw mill, and a sportsman's club.

Dramatic Elk Falls drops nearly 100 feet into North Elk Creek and spectacular Lions Head stands tall as the park's rock sentry.

Staunton State Park is a mosaic of low

grasslands, rocky foothills, soaring granite cliffs, and lush stream corridors. From high grassy meadows at 8,100 feet to

soaring granite cliffs over 10,000 feet, the park's geology, soils, water features, and climate create a rich variety of habitats.

Grazing elk and mule dear favor the aspen and conifer forests. Montane grasslands are a tapestry of native wildflowers and grasses. Wet meadow systems support abundant plant and wildlife communities.

Depending on the season, visitors may see yellow-bellied marmots, tuffed-ear Abert squirrels, coyotes, or wild turkeys.

In 1986 Frances Staunton donated the initial 1,720 acres of her parents' homestead to the State of Colorado. The original cabin remains
